Frequently Asked Questions: Success Through Educational Preparation (STEP)

To help students build a strong academic foundation and achieve higher grades, the Education Fund offers the STEP program, which takes students through the series of core science classes that are the prerequisites for nursing and allied health programs, in a logical order beginning with English and math and continuing through Chemistry, Anatomy, Physiology and Microbiology.

1. How do I participate if the STEP program has already started? Does that mean that I will never be able to catch up? Where we have enough students in one area, we try to set up Education Fund sections of the core science classes. These cohort classes are offered in a series that will be repeated every couple of years. At schools where we are not able to set up cohort classes we offer the entire STEP series of classes every semester, but students must be able to register through the school's regular process. At almost all schools that we work with, students can take English and math classes through this individual registration process. The first thing you should do is talk with a counselor or implementation specialist. They'll want to see your college transcripts, if you have taken classes already. You may need to take an English and Math assessment at the college where you hope to join the STEP program. Not everyone needs to start at the beginning of the series. Even if you've never taken college classes, you may assess high enough to start with the second class. You can start in the middle of the STEP series if you meet both the college's and the Education Fund's prerequisites for that class.

2. Why doesn't the STEP program include all the classes I need in order to get into my program or get my Associates Degree? We realize that there are many other classes you need in order to reach your career goal (psychology, social sciences and humanities, etc.). We can't offer all of them because of financial limitations, but you can access your employer's tuition reimbursement for them, and our counselors can help you map out an educational plan that includes these classes as well.

3. What if I don't need the classes you are offering? Look at the entire STEP series. Plan out when the classes you need are going to be offered in the future. Look at other schools in your area where the Ed Fund is offering the STEP series, and see if one of them will give you the classes you need sooner. Look at the web site or catalog of the school where you hope to do your nurse or allied health training. They all require classes in addition to those in the STEP series (which focuses on English, math and the sciences). Make a plan to get to work on those while you're waiting for the STEP classes you need. Best of all, do this by sitting down with an Ed Fund counselor (and bring your transcripts!)

4. Why aren't you offering classes in my area? We do our best to offer classes in every area where there are eligible employees. First, call our office and make sure we don't have anything in your area. Tell us what kinds of classes you are interested in and the names of the community colleges closest to you. If we don't have anything within a 30-minute drive of where you work, we'll do our best to set something up with a college that is closer to you. 5. If I take classes on my own, will the Education Fund pay for it? The Education Fund tries not to duplicate services already provided by your Employer or the Union. If you want to take classes on your own, you should access your employer's tuition reimbursement program.

6. I am having a hard time getting time off from my job to go to school. What can the Education Fund do to help me out? We encourage you to talk to your supervisor or department head. The STEP program is just a beginning and you'll probably be taking classes for some time to come. Do your best to get your management to support your goals. You should also talk to the union as well. If you're unable to attend STEP classes, you're working evenings. If all else fails, you might explore reducing your work hours or working a different shift – even if it means taking a less desirable job or in a less convenient location. If you're starting down the STEP road, you're heading for training in nursing or allied health. You're going to be going to school for a while, so it pays to find a job that will allow you to go to school.

The Education Fund is a separate organization from your employer and from your union. We don't have any say over job assignments or release from work. But we always want to know if someone is being blocked from attending our classes. We may not be able to get you into this class, but knowing about your situation (and of others like you) may influence when we schedule future classes, as well as the message that we take to the employer and the union.
